


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
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Welcome Messages



As president of the Australia Water Ski Federation, I would like to welcome all the Athletes, Officials, families, and spectators to the 2004 World Barefoot Championships.


As I have spent many years in the Mulwala area I sincerely trust you to will have an enjoyable time and take in the wonderful hospitality of this very unique rural area.

The history of Barefoot Water Skiing

Barefoot water skiers have long been regarded as the daredevils of the sport, but in recent years, barefooting has evolved into much more than just a crazy stunt.

Competitors nowadays compete across the three disciplines of wake slalom, tricks and jump.

Although an American, Dick Pope Jr, is credited as being the first man to barefoot water ski as far back as 1947, it is the Australians who developed and dominated the sport over the following forty years.

In March 1960, the Australian Barefoot Water Ski Club was formed by such great exponents as Jack Murray (deceased), Ray Leighton, John Holland and Ron Marks.

In April 1963, Australia conducted its first official competition, patronised by 38 skiers and eventually won by Irwin Luthiger in Mens and Mary McMillan in Womens.

The growth of the sport has been spectacular worldwide. Such greats in the early years like Ken Matthews, Garry Barton, Mary McMillian, Brett Wing, Kim Lampard and in more recent years Americans Ron Scarpa, Mike Seipel, Rick and Lori Powell, Jennifer Calleri, Australians John Pennay, Sharon Stekelenburg, Brett Sands and South African Nadine DeVilliers have all lead their countries in pursuit of the highly sought after gold medal in the "teams overall" competition.

Advance tricks performed by the top competitors today include 720o turns, toe 180o turns, line steps and even somersaults have been developed,



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astounding the champions of only ten years ago.

One of the more momentous steps in the development of barefoot water skiing was the holding of the first World Barefoot Water Ski Championships in Canberra in 1978. Fifty-four competitors from 11 nations gathered on the glass-like waters of the Molonglo River and so began an international rivalry that has boosted the art of barefooting to an Olympic level.

A further milestone in the sport was the staging of the first Junior Championships in the USA in 1995 and Senior (over 35) Championships in 1999.

With the calibre of skiers competing at the 14th World Barefoot Water Ski Championships

amongst both the men and women, there is little doubt that some outstanding performances will be witnessed and records broken on the Mulwala Ski Lakes.



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The Events



Our sport of Barefoot Water Skiing consists of three main events in each round and they are....

TRICKS

Each competitor is allowed two passes through the course, each fifteen seconds duration. In this time, skiers will attempt as many tricks as possible with points being awarded for each trick according to their degree of difficulty. The types of tricks you will see are multiple surface turns, line steps, rope on toe etc. The skier may enter the course forwards or backwards at whatever speed they nominate and is commonly between 65 to 72 kph. At the beginning of each pass, they will perform a particular start method which also scores according to the degree of difficulty.

WAKE SLALOM

The skier is again permitted two fifteen second passes through the course. Most skiers will elect to do one pass in the forward skiing position and the other in the backwards skiing position. The skier is scored one point for each complete cross over the wake that can be accomplished in each pass on one foot and half a point if completed on two feet. As a matter of interest, master skiers can attain up to nine "one foot" crosses forwards and ten "one foot" crosses backwards in each 15 second pass.

JUMP

This is a truly spectacular event which takes place directly in front of the main crowd. The skier may nominate their desired speed up to a maximum of 72 kph for their pass through the jump course.

The skier is given three jumps and is required to ski over the jump in barefoot ski position, land and ski away, to be eligible to score. The aim is to obtain the longest jump and skiers are now obtaining distances in excess of 26 metres from the jump to their landing position.

TOW BOAT AND JUDGES

Each contestant is towed by an official tow boat capable of 72kph while towing a barefooter and carrying a boat crew of driver, three boat judges and a video operator. The judges time and record each skiers performance independently and return these score cards to the calculators for scoring before final checking and posting by the Chief Judge. Only one skier competes on the course at any one time. The slalom and trick events are recorded on video and this tape is reviewed by the judges should a discrepancy occur and to verify a record performance. On the bank a Chief Judge and Assistant, the Tournament Director and Chief Calculator plus two assistants, ensure the tournament is kept to the schedule.

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Learning to Barefoot

Today there are many ways to teach youngsters to barefoot. Selecting a safe method and laying a proper foundation will enable your child to get on their feet for the first time.

Selecting the correct method and taking a little extra time will make their first footing experience a positive and enjoyable one. The following article is an overview of using the show skis method as a stepping stone in learning to barefoot.

Although water skiing is not a prerequisite for barefooting we recommend spending some time teaching your child some of the basics on ski's. This will allow them to get comfortable with the equipment involved and develop balance, skill and agility which in turn will aid them in learning to barefoot.

Ultimately all these lessons are part of the learning process and will be useful tools in your

child's barefooting skiing future. The psychology factor should be your first consideration in teaching your child to barefoot. Don't force them to foot, nor should you bribe them. Barefooting at this age should be considered a privilege. If they do their chores, get good grades or eat their vegies, then as a reward they could be allowed to go water skiing or barefooting.

Step one is dry land practice.

Dry land practice is taking a handle in your home and practising the various techniques of barefooting. Lay on the floor to practice a deep water start or a three point stance, or stand to practice a one or toe hold.

This is the best practice for a child to learn the proper technique. With these prerequisites completed, your child should learn with relative ease.

Let's start with show skis, but first there are a ►



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

few items you will definitely need: a boat with a training bar, a pair of soft-bottom shoe skis, flotation and a pair of snugfitting wetsuit shorts. We prefer a barefoot suit, but shorts and a vest will suffice if a suit is not available.

With the training bar (boom) at shoulder level, have your child lie flat on their back with their legs extended. Show skis should be flat on the water. This will make it easier for them to plane off. As you accelerate, the skier should learn their upper body back and keep the show skis planing. Once on the plane, your child should sit up, relax their arms and bend their knees. It is quite common for show skis to slide forward, so be sure to bring your feet towards your bum and relax your arms as you stand. Once up, boat speed should be between 15 and 20 miles per hour.

First work form. The feet should be shoulders

width apart, knees flexed slightly forward with a 90 degree bend and upper body perpendicular to the water. Arms should be relaxed and eyes focused forward. Once starts become consistent, begin working one foot and a three point stance (skiing on feet and bum) as this is good

preparation in advancing to barefooting on your feet. Be sure to emphasise proper knee bend and "glide".

And one last thing... on show skis, be sure to teach your child the proper method to fall.

When releasing the boom, they should tuck and roll. This will reduce the chance of any injury to their back or the classic "face plant". Many times these falls can scare

your child into not wanting to pursue the sport.

Remember to be patient and not force or push your child. It should be a fun learning experience. If you have any questions, seek the advice and expertise of a barefooting coaching professional.



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
